Log Convoy Activity

Required:

One 8 or 10 foot pole (or broom stick will work) for each team (split the den into 2)

Instructions:

1. Each patrol lines up in single file at the starting line and lifts their log over their heads.
2. On 'GO' signal, the last scout in line runs to the front while the rest move the log forward hand by hand, keeping it over their heads and not moving their feet.
3. The log continues to move forward as the last scout in line keeps running to the front until the team reaches the finish line.
